LETTER FROM THE CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

Dear Friends,

February 24 marked the 10th Anniversary of Homes for Our Troops. Over the last decade, more than 160 specially adapted homes have been donated to our nation's most severely injured veterans. This year we are positioned to present the 200th home.

We've been tremendously successful these first 10 years, but this success should not be measured by numbers alone. Homes for Our Troops continues to restore freedom and independence to veterans who have sustained injuries so severe, traditional homes no longer provide them a sanctuary, but are a daily reminder of the challenges to be faced for the rest of their lives. Our mission enlightens each community, in which these homes are built, providing individuals the opportunity to "give back" to those who have sacrificed so much. It attracts skilled workers to build homes that enable our veterans to rebuild their lives.

The stories that mark the past decade are too numerous to recount, but the difference made by donors, supporters, volunteers, and countless others is apparent on a daily basis. There is no shortage of milestones and miracles that have occurred during this over the last 10 years. Below are a small few I'd like to share:

2004 – Homes for Our Troops is incorporated and breaks ground on its first home

2005 – The first home is donated to Army Sergeant Peter Damon of Middleborough, MA

2007 – Musician Billy Joel releases the single "Christmas in Falluiah," donating \$500,000 to HFOT

2008 - Homes are built in the host cities of the Republican and Democratic National Conventions

2010 – The 100 More Homes for Our Troops Campaign is launched

2011 – The 100th home build project occurs in Fredericksburg, VA for Marine Corporal Kenny Lyon

Inspiration has known no bounds – from those working in our Massachusetts headquarters who make the day-to-day decisions, to our veterans whose undefeatable heroic spirit is validated through their daily living, to the contributions of volunteer organizations such as the Patriot Riders and the Blue Star Mothers, to our corporate sponsors and donors who witness the exquisite value in each dollar spent to provide the gift of freedom and independence.

As we look ahead to the next decade, we realize Homes for Our Troops needs the continued, nurturing support of municipalities, corporations, foundations, and volunteers, those individuals who are able to donate or those who can simply spread the word. 

2004 - 2014

Homes for Our Troops is proud of the work done in the last decade, a legacy evidenced by nearly 200 veterans all whose lives have been profoundly changed through the gift of a specially adapted home.

Here are a few of their amazing stories.

Our Dream Is Now a Reality

Life changed in an instant for former Marine Staff Sergeant Andrew Robinson on June 20, 2006 when insurgents attacked his vehicle with an improvised explosive device (IED) in a convoy in Al Anbar Province, Iraq. The blast left him with compound fractures to his lower legs, collapsed lungs and a fractured vertebra, rendering him paralyzed from the chest down with partial paralysis in his arms.

But in 2008, Robinson's life changed again - for the better - when HFOT presented him with a specially adapted home complete with a specialized lift system.

"With my home from Homes for Our Troops I can easily access every room," says Robinson. "I can get in and out of bed and the shower on my own with the use of the ceiling lift."

In addition to the physical freedom he enjoys in his home, Robinson is equally grateful for the freedom of worry his mortgage-free home represents, too.

Because of the injuries he sustained in combat, Robinson says it was necessary for his wife Sara to pursue advanced fertility treatments, costs of which are not covered by the Veterans Administration.

"Between procedures, medications, and trips to see specialized doctors in Miami, it took over \$15,000 to make our dream of raising children a reality," he adds. Saving that amount would have been nearly impossible with a monthly mortgage or rent payment for the couple, who are now proud parents of twins Collin and Leah.

"When I look at my life today it is difficult to imagine my life without this amazing blessing from Homes for Our Troops as well as hundreds of volunteers that gave their time, money, and resources in that effort," he says.

Freedom to Be a Family Man

The Tan Family, Philadelphia, Pa.

Freedom for Pisey Tan, can be measured in inches. Six to be exact.

Like many other HFOT home recipients, Pisey Tan is grateful for the fact that he can freely navigate his wheelchair through the doorways at home, which are expanded an extra six inches over that of traditional homes. This seemingly insignificant measurement between door frames is nearly invisible to those who walk through, but to Tan, it's a harbinger of pride and independence.

"The best thing about the home is being able to help raise the family with my wife," says Tan. "It gives me the chance to be the man I wanted to be before my injuries, also letting me be the father I never had."

Tan and Sieng Nai have been married five years; they have two daughters Alyssa, 5, and Isabella,1. The family lives in the specially adapted home that HFOT built for Tan in 2006 in Philadelphia. Tan was severely injured on his second deployment with the 3rd Battalion, 69th Armored Regiment, when his vehicle was struck by an improvised explosive device (IED).

After both legs were later surgically amputated, Tan worried about becoming a burden to friends and family, especially to his younger brother who had to carry him upstairs to bed.

"The idea of me, once a strong and very independent soldier, now a broken man that needs his mother and brother to do the simplest thing such as walking up and down the stairs was truly a depressing point in my life," Tan says.

Then there was the physical pain he endured every day that came from not being able to use his wheelchair.

"The only way I got around in my old home was scooting around on my butt," says Tan, who recalls being so physically exhausted and sore that he could barely move let alone slip on his prosthetics.

"Now I am able to move about the home and do things, such as putting my children on my lap while in my wheelchair and take them to their room and put them down in their own bed to sleep."

That room-to-room accessibility, made possible by a six-inch modification, gives Tan the freedom to be the happy, proud family man he is today.

"Being able to be there for every part of my children's lives, even just putting them to sleep, really is a life changer."

A letter of thanks from Ivonne Thompson

Ivonne is the wife and caregiver of HFOT veteran, former Naval Petty Officer Anthony Thompson, and mother to Anthony Jr. (AJ). Anthony sustained a traumatic brain injury (TBI) and an incomplete spinal cord injury after a suicide bomber detonated an explosive near him and his fellow Marines.

Life is full of uncertainties for a wounded warrior and his family. Setbacks in health are often inevitable, but what should not be a setback in the life of a wounded warrior and his family is going home after a life-altering change. For Anthony, AJ and I, going home was the best thing that could have ever happened to us; well, besides being put into contact with Homes for Our Troops.

After almost four years of Anthony being an inpatient and AJ and I living in Fisher Homes and hotels, we were ready for some stability and togetherness. AJ never knew what it was like to live in a home that was "ours." And that's exactly what we received from HFOT on December 7, 2010, the day all three of us were FINALLY able to live together as a family under one roof.

The instant that Anthony set wheels in his new home, he seemed at peace and relaxed. I continued to assure him that he was safe; as I always do in a new environment, and told him that we were finally "Home."

Since he was first injured,
Anthony had lived his life under fluorescent lighting with a plethora of doctors and professionals constantly in his face.
But being home now means no doctors around and wondering if I had learned everything I needed to know to care for Anthony. It was overwhelming and almost surreal. What gave me peace of mind, though, was knowing that this would be our forever home and that I didn't need to worry about anything except my boys.

The equipment and customizations put into the home for Anthony made everything a little easier.

Getting him in and out of bed every day is a breeze with his lift, and there is plenty of space in his room to allow for his chair and the whole family at once. Anthony has no boundaries and that makes me happy and relieved.

It's been three years since we came home and I couldn't have asked for anything better. We continue to live happily as a family under one roof. AJ wakes every morning and runs to his dad's room to say good morning. Before bedtime every night, he climbs in bed with his dad with his PJ's on, and tells him all about his day, then says goodnight and seals it with a hug and lots of kisses. Life is almost as it should be, but more importantly, the one certainty we have is we are happy and HOME!

Kate Awtrey's not exaggerating when she tells friends that the earth moved the day she met Marine Cpl David King - the man she will marry. That's because the couple met on Dec. 15, 2012 at HFOT's Groundbreaking event in Hawkinsville, Ga., for Marine Cpl Tony Mullis' specially adapted home.

Awtrey, who's a professional photographer, was hired by HFOT to cover the event that day when she caught the attention of King, a member of the Color Guard detachment that presented the colors before the ceremony.

"I was packing my stuff up and getting ready to leave later," Awtrey explains. "Then Dave approached me and said, 'Could I get a copy of that photo you took of me and my buddies in the color guard?""

The two subsequently emailed after the holidays, and then made plans to get together when King returned home on leave. They then had their first date in February 2013.

"My mom asked me the day after our date how it went, and I said, 'Oh it was great. I am going to marry him," says Awtrey.

Awtrey's gut proved right nine months later, on November 9, 2013, when King proposed to her just before the Marine Corps Ball, the surprise moment captured on camera by Awtrey's brother. Wedding bells will ring for Awtrey and King on May 24, 2014 in Blue Ridge, Ga. A 1950's inspired garden party is planned.

For HFOT's Austin and Donna Burchard, their dog Chase is more than just a pet

There are three comforts that make Austin Burchard's life as an injured veteran a little easier. As an Army Sergeant who was left a paraplegic from a gunshot wound he received in Afghanistan in 2009, the first of those would be his loving wife of almost 11 years and dedicated caretaker Donna.

Next would be the couple's specially adapted home in Lutz, Florida that they received from HFOT in September, 2011. The third comes in the form of canine intervention - a golden retriever named Chase, Austin's trained service dog.

"Chase is my extension when I need him to make up for what my injury has taken," Austin explains.

Chase can open doors, turn on lights, fetch if Austin dropped something or needs something, and steady Austin if he falls out of his chair to help him get back in.

That help is a huge relief to Donna. "Chase does so much for Austin. It gives me the peace of mind that they are okay and safe out in public," she says.

The Burchards received Chase through the national non-profit, National Education for Assistance Dog Services (NEADS). Chase's training on basic commands and behaviors began with a trainer as a puppy, with additional training received through the Prison Pup Program in Rhode Island. After 18 months, Austin was flown to Massachusetts and trained with Chase for two weeks; the two "graduated" in October 2011, and have been inseparable since.

During days that are pain or stress filled, Chase guards Austin to protect him so others won't bother him. Chase is also trained to respond to Donna, who mastered Chase's commands for occasions when Austin is ill or hospitalized. So Chase keeps a watchful eye on Donna, too, if she falls behind while they're out walking.

Through his injuries and subsequent two years of hospitalization and countless surgeries, Austin remains grateful. "I don't know where I would be without our home, my wife and Chase," he says.

"Chase is my extension when I need him to make up for what my injury has taken."


